
New Site Promotes Careers


Indigenous People. Building Careers. Shaping the Future.

In May the language circle was done as part of the Lac Seul Career Fair by KERC.


The next circle and last circle will be on held on June 6 at 5 p.m. at the Sioux Lookout Access Centre and will be lead by Sarah Johnson.

KERC's Print Production and Publishing Department Updates

Greeting from the Language and Culture, Print Production and Publishing department of Kwayaciiwin.

We have undergone some changes in the last several months in order to better serve and fulfill the growing needs of Kwayaciiwin's corporate communities, as well as fee for service communities, organizations, business, companies and schools in the region regarding the printing, publishing, production and distribution of First Nations based books, resources and materials.

These changes include:

- a production (design) and printing schedule
- a more streamlined intake process for requested work and orders (including quoting and invoicing system)
- Re-prioritizing Kwayaciiwin's corporate communities before fee for service clients

These changes will help us more efficiently and effectively support communities and their language and cultural needs in terms of resources, books, curriculum, in-class learning tools and the many other printed and published materials from our extensive library that has been developed over the last 11 years of service to our communities.

First off, supporting Kwayaciiwin's corporate communities with much needed resources, books, in-class learning tools and many other printed and published materials will be our main priority. Community orders will be prioritized as much as possible so communities, schools and teachers will have access to much needed resources for their lesson plans and classrooms in a timely and more efficient fashion. To do this we have implemented a more solidified printing and production schedule to help prioritize and organize work and requests coming in. This will aid our production team's ability to fill orders as well as aid in effective communication with communities

about the orders they send to Kwayaciiwin. Based on the schedules our production assistant and community staff liaison can accurately access what stage in the process the work requested or order is in, be it translation, design, printing or distribution (shipping) and when the estimated time of arrival for the work requested or the order of resources will be.

We have also implemented a more streamlined process for taking in requests from fee for service clients. The translation, design, printing and publishing services will be quoted upon the request of these services and deposit or PO will be necessary to be put into the pertaining schedule. Any resources and printed materials order from a fee for service client will require a PO for the order to be placed in the schedule. This is, of course, is only for outside organizations, businesses, companies or clients that are not one of Kwayaciiwin corporate communities. Corporate communities of Kwayaciiwin do not have to pay any fees associated with orders, resources or work requests.

Additionally, we are also working on stocking up on our in-house inventory and keeping track of our inventory moving forward. With an up-to-date accurate inventory we can process orders from our communities much faster and more efficiently.

As of right now the printing, production team is very busy with orders with the end of the school year fast approaching.

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Student Success Program Update



The Student Success team at Kwayaciiwin is committed to seeing our students reach for the stars and see success that connects both mentally, physically, emotionally and spiritually.

Since September, the FNSSP team has completed over 80 community visits. This includes both day trips as well as longer trips with numerous team members to provide support throughout all grade levels. The School Success team has done Family Literacy/Numeracy Fun Nights, after school workshops, classroom visits and community career fairs. In addition to this, the success team has been available to support staff and students throughout the district in pushing their success goals to new heights. As we wrap up the 2018-2019 school year, this is a few of our highlights:

- Elders in the Classroom Project has shown great success and great interaction with students and elders within the school setting as well as out in the community. Elders are sharing their knowledge with the youth and as such the youth are engaged in learning about their history.
- Bright Ideas Projects that surround themselves with retention and technology initiatives of all subject areas- gardening, robots, 3D printers, school libraries, school kitchens, professional workshops for both students and staff, artist visits, musician visits.
- Professional Development for teachers- Chiefs of Ontario workshops, ONECA annual workshop for Social Counsellors, Numeracy and Literacy training, DRA training, TE/TA training, RAZ Plus, Jolly Phonics, Effective manipulative use
- The technology working group and the native

language teachers group combined for an integrated technology focus group around using technology for anishiniimowin language instruction.


- Locally developed proposals to meet school-specific goals
- Outdoor Education workshops provided as a started point to more land-based professional development opportunities
- NOW Play language development partnership with OISE through SSHRC.
- Community level student engage that includes after school programs, multi grade collaboration and development of student art and books.

Overall, the First Nation Student Success Program continues to see growth and success within the district schools in a variety of areas. We are putting student learning and best interest at the forefront in all aspects of programming and the students are engaging in stronger education. As with anything, there is continued support needed and the schools each have their own specific goals. We are working with them to reach these goals and provide strategies to move forward. As a staff, we are looking forward to seeing what the 2019-2020 school year will bring.



Technology and Language Workshop


The Technology in the Classroom lead, Alex Short and Native Language Specialist, Kathy Wesley teamed up to guide several teachers from KERC's partnering communities during a Language and Technology Workshop in Sioux Lookout from March 25-29, 2019.

The group of teachers received hands-on training from Alex and Kathy in the use of the technology such as iPads and smart boards to create resources in Syllabics in their specific community dialect. They explored the varying differences between each communities dialect and how technology can be used to support students' development of syllabics writing and speaking the language.

Each teacher community also received a tour of KERC's library of resources and contributed to a discussion about creating new and better resources for teacher use in the classroom moving forward.

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


